# Reading Log Guidelines

1. Reading logs will be handed out every Monday and collected the following Monday. You will turn in your Reading Response with your log. Be sure your reading response is on a separate piece of paper (typed or hand written), with a full heading.
2. You are expected to read for at least 20 minutes each night, four nights per week. If you are unable to read one night, you may make up the time another night as long as you have spent 80 minutes reading during the week. **READING MORE THAN THE MINIMUM IS ENCOURAGED!**
3. You may read independently, to someone else, or with someone else.

## Reading Response

During the week, answer one of the following questions. Write at least five sentences for your response. Try to choose a different question to answer each week. You will turn your response in with your log on Monday.

1. List five questions you'd ask if you could talk with a character from this book.
2. Be a TV or radio reporter and give a report of a scene from the book as if it is happening "live".
3. Select a character from the book and create a diary entry for him or her. Pretend that you are actually the character and you are writing an entry in your diary.
4. Write an advice column using one of the characters from your book. There should be two entries: one from your character seeking advice and one to your character from the advice columnist.
5. Artful Artist- Draw a picture about the book and write a description of it.
6. Who has a problem in the story? Explain the problem.
